









Early in his religious life, St. Anthony was invited to a Dominican Ordination by his Provincial. When the time for ordination arrived, it was found that no one had been appointed to preach. The superior turned first to the Dominicans, and asked that one of their brothers should address a few words to the assembled brethren; but everyone declined, saying they were not prepared.

In their emergency, they chose Anthony, whom they thought was only capable of reading from the Missal and Breviary, and commanded him to speak whatever the Spirit of God might put into his mouth. Anthony, compelled by obedience, spoke at first slowly and timidly, but soon enkindled with fervor, he began to explain the most hidden sense of Holy Scripture with such profound sophistication all were struck with astonishment. With that moment began Anthony's public career.

That Spirit is what St. Anthony School Programs is all about. We give our students the opportunity to transform their lives and become active members of our community. 
The program seeks to maximize the individual student's potential for academic learning, to foster self-respect and confidence and to develop competence in employment and living skills.

## St. Anthony Student Artwork in Smithsonian Exhibition

For 20 year old Jacob Brown of Mars, the creative act gives purpose to his life. Even though his spastic cerebral palsy put many limitations on his mobility and fine motor skills, it also forms his visual language and his artistic process. "I sustain myself through the creation of art," said Jacob, a student at the St. Anthony School Programs Post-Secondary Education Program at Duquesne University. "Growing up as the youngest in a creative family, I was surrounded by family members who created art. To create my own art, I use found materials from my father's garage and my brother's art studio.' For years Jacob's artwork has been featured in local exhibitions, and in the fall of 2012 his painting Copper 2 was selected by the Department of VSA and Accessibility at the John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts for display at the Smithsonian Institution's S. Dillon Ripley Center. Jacob's work was displayed at the Smithsonian from September 2012 through mid January of this year.

### About the Post Secondary Program

The Post Secondary Program of Saint Anthony School Programs has just started its 18th year at Duquesne University. This year we are currently educating 24 students from the Pittsburgh Diocese from four different counties - Allegheny, Butler, Washington, and Westmoreland. Our main goal will always continue to be to prepare each student to become as independent as possible so they can become contributing members of society. Each student is trained vocationally 100% of the day and has a chance to learn a variety of job skills including office work, mailrooms, maintenance

positions, childcare and food service. Students are trained to use public transportation and learn life skills such



as grocery shopping, cleaning and laundry to help increase their independence.
